

Poetry Links to Phonics Lessons

In *Phonics Lessons: Letters, Words, and How They Work, Grade 1*, you will find under LINK, Shared Reading recommendations that enable you to connect learning across the Language and Literacy Framework. Often, the shared reading recommendations suggest you turn to *Sing A Song of Poetry* for instructional follow-up using particular poems, songs, and verse. This list links many phonics lessons to a specific poem that extends and refines the instructional aim of the lesson; however, you will notice that not all lessons are linked to a poem and, sometimes, a lesson is linked to two or more poems. What does this mean? The links are completely flexible! Feel free to find and make your own links, and do not feel compelled to use every poem we recommend.

The primary goal of this collection is, quite literally, to "sing a song of poetry"! Invite your children to chant, recite, echo, and play with the poems. Above all, *Sing A Song of Poetry* is meant to inspire a love of language.
